We uplift young people from under-resourced communities by empowering them to get into college, graduate, and embark on meaningful career paths that provide greater economic mobility.

We served 4,500 students through our open-access, multi-year programs, partnering with educators and engaging 130+ volunteers.

COLLEGE ACCESS PROGRAM

We support students from seven LAUSD high schools, one public charter school, and one community partner by providing college preparation, individualized counseling, financial aid and scholarship guidance, college tours, and more.

86% First-Generation

1 in 3 first-gen students drop out in the first 3 years of college, nationally.

95% Low-Income

Nationally, 15% of low-income youth attain a degree compared to 59% among high-income peers.

98% BIPOC

Latinx (87%), AANHPI (7%), Black (3%), White (2%), Other (1%)
